

# What Presbyterian Hospice Does Provide and What It Does Not Provide

Hospice services are provided by a team of professionals. This team includes your doctor, registered nurses, licensed social workers, home health aides, chaplains, volunteers and bereavement counselors. <p align="center"><b>Presbyterian Medicare/Medicaid Hospice provides: IN THE HOME</b></p>	<p align="center"><b>NOT Provided under Medicare/Medicaid in the home or on Hospice In Patient Unit</b></p>
<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. <b>Registered Nurse (RN):</b> A specialist in pain/symptom management who will visit as needed for assessment, teaching, nursing care and symptom control support. The frequency of visits will be determined by the needs of the patient.</li> <li>2. <b>24-hour on-call RN:</b> Specialists available for telephone consultation and if indicated, available for unplanned, urgent visits 7 days per week (nights, weekends, holidays).</li> <li>3. <b>Social Services:</b> The Social Worker is available to offer emotional support, assist with financial concerns and community resources such as hired help. The social worker makes visits as often as necessary.</li> <li>4. <b>Home Health Aide:</b> Trained personnel who are able to assist the patient with a bath, personal care, and light housekeeping.</li> <li>5. <b>Pastoral Care:</b> A Chaplain who is non-denominational and offers spiritual support to patients and families.</li> <li>6. <b>Bereavement:</b> Counselor who offers support to families for one year after the death of the loved one. Includes mailings to help with the grief process.</li> <li>7. <b>Volunteer:</b> A trained person in the community who assists with day-to-day tasks and provides caregiver relief in the home.</li> <li>8. <b>Medications</b> related to the Hospice Diagnosis. Delivery of these medications is provided.</li> <li>9. <b>Medical Equipment</b> (such as oxygen, bed, wheelchair, bedside commode) and care supplies (gloves, diapers) driven by patient need and terminal diagnosis.</li> </ol>	<p>24-hour custodial care in the home by a nurse or home health aide is not covered.</p> <p>*Volunteers do not provide personal "hands on" care.</p> <p>*Medications NOT related to the Hospice Diagnosis.</p> <p>*Adjustable double beds, lifting chairs, motorized wheelchairs or scooters, automobile wheelchair lifts and ramps are not covered.</p>
<p align="center"><b>IN THE HOSPICE INPATIENT UNIT</b></p>	
<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>10. <b>In Patient Unit (IPU)</b> – unique to our Hospice – a 15-bed facility managed by our Hospice team with private rooms and baths, fully furnished kitchen, family room and children's room with TV and games.             <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. <b>Respite</b> – is a planned 5 day break for patient and caregivers. If a bed is not available, a respite bed will be provided with a local licensed Nursing Home.</li> <li>b. <b>Symptom Control</b> – an IPU admit with physician approval for observation and treatment of patient symptoms. If a bed is not available on the IPU, a bed in the Presbyterian hospital system or a community healthcare facility (Nursing Home) will be used instead.</li> </ol> </li> </ol>	<p>* Because the inpatient unit is licensed as a short-stay acute setting, unlimited stay on the Hospice IPU for custodial care is not covered.</p> <p><i>*If you have other insurance policies, your Social Worker can research these benefits for you.</i></p>
